



Nestled in the wooded, glacial hills of Washburn County, Hunt Hill is one of northern Wisconsin's most beautiful State Natural areas. Situated on 501 acres of majestic forests, meadow, bogs and pristine glacial lakes, our Audubon Sanctuary and Nature Center offers an ideal setting in which to experience the world of nature.

The undisturbed aquatic and terrestrial communities support osprey, bald eagle, loon, beaver, otter and fascinating plants such as the carnivorous pitcher plant and sundew found in the bog.

Miles of hiking trails and three clear glacial lakes make the possibilities for outdoor adventure and learning endless.

We have residential facilities for up to 90 campers with a barn kitchen/dining hall. Environmental education programs are available at Hunt Hill for all ages—kindergarten through 100+ years!

### **Forests**

How can you tell one Oak from another? And: Why can’t I split my firewood? High School and up. Audiences up to 100. Around 1 hour

### **Predator and Prey: Songs and Stories of the Animals around Us**

Native American, European and African stories all give different views of the relationships between the eater and the eaten. Each of the stories has valuable information, a rich context and a unique viewpoint. Ages 6-12. Audiences up to 150. Around 1 hour

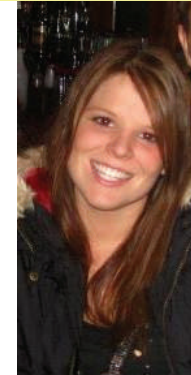

Hunt Hill Audubon Sanctuary’s Program Director, Nikki Nelson, presents a new twist on education! With a degree in biology education, she uses her background to focus on interactive learning. Nikki has in-school teaching experience and has been a naturalist in Mississippi and at Hunt Hill.

Community and school programs on the following topics are available for scheduling. These are interactive, exploratory programs are adaptable for all ages.

- **Sensory Awareness**  
Hone observation skills through activities that will challenge the senses.
- **Predator/Prey**  
Discover how wild animals survive through a series of role-playing games and group discussions.
- **Adaptations**  
Study plant & animal adaptations then simulate bird beak adaptations.
- **Vascular plants**  
Through a series of experiments and demonstrations learn more about vascular plants.
- **Insect Investigations**  
Observe, hold and study live specimens as we discuss what ‘makes’ an insect.
